4. What does the substitute know about our situation before walking in, and how does that get to them?

5. Who supervises the caregiver, how often, and does a nurse ever visit?

6. What gets written down after a shift, and can we see it?

7. What is the minimum shift, the rate, and what triggers a higher rate?

8. How do we raise a problem, and what happens after we do?

ASK THE CAREGIVER, IF YOU GET TO MEET THEM FIRST

2. What do you need from us to do this well?

3. What would you want to know about someone before your first morning in their house?
